Helen became sick as a child and lost the ability to see and hear. She later became the first deaf and blind person to earn a college degree. She became a humanitarian leader.

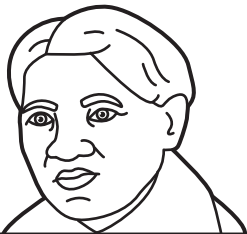
BORN: 1788 - Idaho

Emily Dickinson

Millicent Fawcett

Elizabeth Stanton

Elizabeth was one of the early leaders in the women's rights movement. She was a gifted writer and wrote a declaration that demanded equal rights for woman in many different areas.

BORN: 1820 - Massachusetts
DIED: 1906 - New York



Susan B. Anthony

Susan was a leader in demanding equal rights for women and African-Americans. She traveled the country giving hundreds of speeches. She was once arrested for voting.

BORN: 1997 - Pakistan



Malala Yousafzai

Despite being threatened by the Taliban, Malala is speaking out for the rights of girls to be educated. She survived being shot in the head and is the youngest person to receive the Nobel Peace Prize.

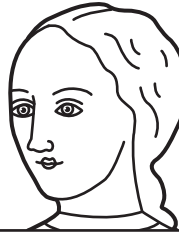
BORN: 1929 - Belgium

Elizabeth was queen of England for 44 years. She united her country and it became one of the most powerful countries in the world. During her reign was called the Golden Age.

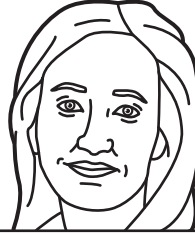
BORN: 1953 - Pakistan
